

Ascension St. Vincent's is celebrating its 125th anniversary

On a rainy, windy evening in November 1898, two members of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, along with their spiritual director, arrived in Birmingham from St. Louis. As described by author Tom Wofford in *The St. Vincent's Story: A Century of Caring*, the world they stepped into was a frightful place. "The city...drew its life's blood from iron and steel and coal, and these industries created a hard-living, grimy atmosphere. City sewers emptied into Valley and Village Creeks. Much of the city's water supply was unfiltered and polluted. There were frequent mining and furnace accidents, many more serious than

the company infirmaries could treat. Tuberculosis and typhoid were common. There had been a smallpox epidemic for the second year in a row. Birmingham was a city in need. Even though there were more than 100,000 people in the immediate vicinity, the city had no hospital."

The travelers, however, had come south to start a hospital, so they did. Almost immediately, they rented an old mansion on 15th Street South and opened the doors to patients.


Flash forward 125 years from that bleak evening in 1898. Birmingham gradually moved away from its dependence on industries of the earth to an economy based on healthcare, finance, technology, and education. In the meantime, St. Vincent's Hospital grew, not only in terms of bricks and mortar, but in its capacity to offer more services to more people over a wider geographic area.

In 2007, St. Vincent's Hospital merged with Eastern Health System to form St. Vincent's Health System, now Ascension St. Vincent's, which operates five hospitals and more than 25 healthcare facilities.

Harking back to its roots, Ascension St. Vincent's maintains its strong faith-based approach to patient care and offers a continuing commitment to excellence in term of facilities, staffing, and technology.

One NICU Family Donates to Benefit Others

The arrival of Samuel "Sam" Hinton on September 19, 2019, was a big surprise to his parents, Tyler and Jessica Hinton. Not that they weren't expecting him. They just didn't expect him to arrive quite so soon. Born at Ascension St. Vincent's Birmingham two months ahead

of schedule, Sam spent the first six weeks of his life in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

"As with most parents-to-be, a stay in the NICU was never on our radar until it became reality," said Tyler. "It was obviously a scary experience at first, but the staff quickly put us at ease, and it became our second home that Fall."

Sam started out in an incubator then spent the last few weeks of his stay in a bassinet. His parents watched in awe as skilled doctors and nurses, combined with the NICU's state-of-the-art technology, allowed their tiny 3 lb. 11 oz. son to grow healthy and strong.

"Now, at age 4, Sam suffers no

long-term effects of having been born prematurely," his dad said.

In 2022, Tyler served as a Board Fellow at Ascension St. Vincent's Foundation through the Rotaract Club of Birmingham. Through that process, he learned of a need for more bassinets like the one that had helped Sam during his NICU stay. "Jess and I felt strongly that we owed Sam's perfect health to technology like this, so we made the donation to help ensure that other families have the same chance we did for a positive outcome," said Tyler, who now serves on the Foundation's Junior Board. "Because we can never

fully repay St. Vincent's for the gift of our healthy, happy family, we're honored to play a small part in helping continue its mission of care."

The Hintons live in Mountain Brook with Sam and their dog, Clementine. Jessica started Empress Stationery part-time in 2007 then went full-time in 2013; Tyler came on board in 2018.

"We consider giving as a central pillar of the Empress culture and an important responsibility to the community," said Tyler. "We believe that with success comes responsibility, and that responsibility includes using whatever resources are at your disposal to help lift others up."

Father/Son Donations Honor Bruno Cancer Center

A father/son duo recently expressed gratitude for lifesaving treatment rendered to the son at Ascension St. Vincent's Bruno Cancer Center with separate gifts to Ascension St. Vincent's Foundation. The donations were directed to the radiation oncology department.

"It was just a token of our appreciation to St. Vincent's," said John Blackwell, the father of 42-year-old Austin Blackwell. "My family and I are so thankful for the care he received there, and I don't think it could have been any better."

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In the spring of 2021, the younger Blackwell began experiencing unusual fatigue and frequent headaches, neither of which had troubled him before. Even more concerning, he was getting worse.

"I've basically been one of the healthiest people I know of until this happened," he said. "Maybe a couple of broken fingers and small sport injuries. But nothing else, not even allergies." So, when the usually energetic father of three declined to attend a family graduation celebration, an occasion he would normally not miss, wife Haleigh, a dentist, became insistent.

"You need an MRI," she said.

Soon an MRI scan was scheduled, and a journey that Blackwell never dreamed of taking began to unfold.

The scan revealed a cancerous mass in his brain (an oligodendroglioma), and Blackwell quickly found himself headed for an operating room.

"Eight days later, I was having brain surgery that involved an ear-to-ear incision and removal of the tumor through my left frontal lobe," he said. "It was insane."

Surgery went well, though a tough post-surgical recovery followed. When it came time for cancer treatment, Blackwell had no doubt that Ascension St. Vincent's Bruno Cancer Center was the place to be. A course of radiation and chemotherapy was subsequently administered under the care of Dr. John Piede and Dr. Susan Salter.

"I was born at St. Vincent's, and I've been connected to the Salter family from the beginning. The medical care they have provided for the community over the last 50-plus years is remarkable," Blackwell said. "In my case, Sally, a general surgeon, sat outside the operating room for nine hours with my medical power of attorney to make any needed decisions, Susan put together a complex radiation treatment plan and executed it flawlessly, and even Merle, a radiation oncologist, drove me to chemotherapy. I literally wouldn't be alive today without the Salter family and St. Vincent's."

Two years after treatment, Blackwell reports no visible signs of cancer.

"The surgery got rid of over 79 percent of the cancer, and the chemo and radiation took care of the rest," he said. "The obvious worry is that it could come back, but right now, I feel great. No medications, no treatments."



Love for Camp Bluebird Prompts Legacy Gift

Since 2015, Olivia Davidson has served as a Camp Bluebird volunteer. Her sisters also volunteer, driving from Georgia and using vacation time for camp time.

"It's become a family affair," said Davidson, who helps with registration. "We make gift bags, sort and fold T-shirts, and make cute little door tags (bluebirds of course!) so campers can easily find their rooms. Then we get everybody checked in, and the fun begins!"

Founded in 1985, Camp Bluebird is America's first adult cancer camp, where survivors gather for three days and two nights for sharing, educational workshops, and activities. The camp is sponsored and fully funded by Ascension St. Vincent's Foundation and private donations.

"Camp Bluebird is a wonderful experience," said Davidson. "The campers are full of love and support for each other."

Though a 10-year cancer survivor, Davidson has never been to Camp Bluebird as a camper. She simply responded to an urgent call for camp volunteers to hospital volunteers, thinking she was signing up to stuff a few envelopes. Four days of hard work later, she was hooked.

"Because of my love for Camp Bluebird and the Foundation," said Davidson, "I've named them as a beneficiary on my IRA."

Gray's biggest goal as Junior Board chair is to encourage members to help raise awareness of what the Foundation does and how it supports Ascension St. Vincent's. "I want us to fundraise for the Foundation because I truly believe in the Foundation's mission and can see firsthand what a difference it makes in people's lives," she said.

"We've helped fund new equipment for the NICU and recently helped purchase some new bassinets for the Women and Children's Center," she said. "Because of the age of many of our members, the women and children's initiatives are something that's important to us."
